Reforms for Women

- National Woman Suffrage Association: working on an amendment to give women the right to vote
- Some western states allow women to vote
- Women's suffrage movement gains followers as more women work outside the home

- Carrie Chapman Catt leads the Association: her strategy was to win the right for women to vote one state at a time
- Alice Paul, Rose Winslow and followers picket the White house for months in 1917
- Wilson decides to support a suffrage amendment
- 1920: 19th Amend. gives women the right to vote

- Increased higher education opportunities for women
- Women's clubs formed to improve their minds, help with reforms
- Florence Kelley: pushed for reform for child labor
- The temperance movement gained strength: alcohol was a threat to families
